**Course Description:**

This course is a review and application of skills in reading and writing. Emphasizes on vocabulary, acquisition, reading, composition, and culture. Designed for individuals with oral proficiency in Spanish, these courses are considered equivalent to SPAN 2311 and SPAN 2312. *Prerequisite:* SPAN 2313.

**4. Peninsular Short Stories**

- a. Identify and analyze the elements of short stories.
- b. Generate an informed opinion about short stories based on historical and artistic standards.
- c. Discuss the different ways short stories can be interpreted and how it conveys messages.

**5. Drama**

- a. Identify and analyze the elements of drama
- b. Identify and discuss the influences of political, social and cultural values upon drama.
- c. Discuss the different ways drama can be interpreted and how it conveys messages.
- d. Critique and evaluate drama in writing and/or orally.

**6. Interrelationships of the humanities**

- a. Discuss the inter-relationships among art, literature, and culture.
- b. Identify recurrent themes in Hispanic art, literature, culture and inter-relationships in essay format.

**Note:** Accents will be covered in this course.
